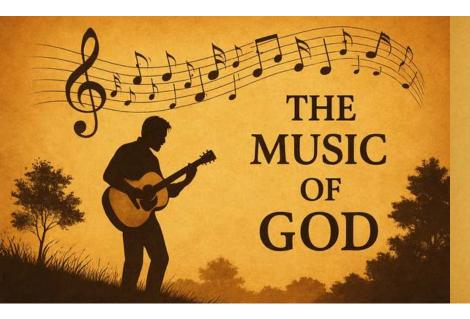

The Music of God: A Ministry, Not Entertainment

Dearly beloved in Christ,

Greetings to you all in the precious name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

As we step into the month of September, our hearts are filled with thanksgiving for the many ways God has guided and sustained our congregation. This month, I would like to reflect with you on a theme that lies close to the heart of our worship life: **the music of God.**

The Biblical Foundation of Music in Worship

Music has always held a sacred place in the life of God's people. In the Old Testament, David was called to play the harp whenever King Saul was troubled by an evil spirit (1 Samuel 16:23). This was not entertainment. This was ministry. This was spiritual warfare through music. Every note David played carried the presence of God, and that presence drove away the darkness.

The same truth continues in heaven. Isaiah saw the seraphim crying out in unending song: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty; the whole earth is full of His glory" (Isaiah 6:3). In Revelation, John describes heaven's eternal music: "I heard a sound from heaven like the roar of rushing waters and like a loud peal of thunder. The sound I heard was like that of harpists playing their harps. And they sang a new song before the throne" (Revelation 14:2-3).

This shows us something powerful: music is not optional in worship. It is part of the very rhythm of heaven itself. When we sing, we join in that eternal choir.

The Role of the Choir: A Sacred Calling

When a church choir sings, it is not simply filling time in the service. It is leading the congregation into the presence of God. The choir's ministry is not performance—it is proclamation. Songs are prayers wrapped in melody. They preach Christ in ways that words alone cannot.

But here is the danger: sometimes choir members forget this sacred responsibility. Sometimes we treat choir practice casually, or come unprepared, or sing without enthusiasm. But let us remember: when you dedicated yourself to the choir, you made a promise before God and His church. That promise was not to "sing when you feel like it." That promise was to serve faithfully.

As Paul reminds us: "Whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31). The choir's task is to lift the worship of the whole church, to prepare hearts to hear the Word of God, and to remind us of the heavenly chorus. If the choir sings lazily, the worship weakens. But when the choir sings with faith and passion, heaven touches earth.

Music as a Channel of God's Healing and Deliverance

Think again of David before Saul. That one shepherd boy, with one harp, drove away torment from a king. That is the power of Spirit-filled music. Music offered in worship is not simply melody—it carries divine authority when offered in faith.

A faithful choir is not just 'songs.' It is exercising a ministry of healing, of deliverance, and of comfort for God's people. A hymn sung in faith can comfort the grieving. A psalm can bring peace to a troubled mind. Choir members, never underestimate your ministry. Every time you sing, you are helping someone fight a battle you may not even know about.

CSI: Kerala Story By Rev. Joe Malayil



On September 27, 1947, a historic event took place in the history of Christianity in India—the formation of the Church of South India (CSI). The CSI became the first united church in the world formed on the basis of both episcopal and non-episcopal traditions. This year, as we celebrate the 78th anniversary of CSI, we look back with gratitude at the missionary societies whose vision, sacrifice, and labor shaped the soil of Kerala, preparing the way for the CSI's foundation. Among them, the Church Missionary Society (CMS), the London Missionary Society (LMS), and the Basel Mission stand out for their enduring contributions in evangelism, education, social transformation, and cultural enrichment. Their efforts have left a legacy that continues to inspire the CSI to be a witnessing and serving church.

Church Missionary Society (CMS)

By the early 19th century, the Malankara Church, which followed the Syriac tradition, came into contact with the Church Missionary Society (CMS). The CMS was an evangelical Anglican mission movement. Their work in central Travancore began in 1820, initially aiming to bring biblical renewal and promote education within the Malankara Syrian Church. One of their major contributions was the Old Seminary in Kottayam. Missionaries like Benjamin Bailey taught theology, trained clergy, and encouraged a deeper understanding of the Bible. Bailey also started the first printing press in Kerala in 1821. Through this, the Malayalam Bible, hymnals, and Christian books were widely printed and circulated. This greatly increased biblical literacy among the people.

However, differences soon arose. The CMS missionaries wanted to bring reforms in theology and worship, but these ideas were not fully accepted by the Malankara Church. In 1836, the famous Mavelikara Synod rejected the CMS proposals. This disagreement caused a division. Out of this struggle, the Mar Thoma Syrian Church emerged under the leadership of reformers like Abraham Malpan. He strongly emphasized the protestant theology, like the authority of Scripture, worship in the local language, and a simpler liturgy.

After the separation, the CMS shifted its focus to building an Anglican identity in Kerala. They set up schools, colleges, and medical institutions, and actively evangelized among non-Christian communities. Over time, Anglican congregations grew in Kerala. Their mission bore fruit in the formation of Anglican congregations that later became part of the CSI at its unification in 1947.

London Missionary Society (LMS)

The LMS began its work in 1806 in southern Travancore, with a focus on both evangelism and social upliftment. Their greatest strength lay in their commitment to education, particularly for the marginalized. In a society deeply divided by caste, LMS missionaries opened schools to people of all backgrounds, empowering the oppressed and especially promoting the education of women—a radical move at the time.

The LMS also pioneered in the printing ministry, establishing printing presses that produced tracts, catechisms, and Christian literature in the local languages. LMS established a printing press in 1821 at Nagarcoil. Later, in 1830, another press was installed at **Neyyoor**, but it was subsequently consolidated back to Nagercoil. Later a press was moved from Nagercoil to **Thiruvananthapuram**, which eventually evolved into the **Government Press**, responding to royal requests for printed educational material. These presses not only spread the gospel but also contributed to the growth of literacy and intellectual awakening in Kerala. Their social vision extended to the eradication of caste-based discrimination and the fight for human dignity. By empowering oppressed classes and women through education and faith, the LMS planted seeds of social justice that continue to bear fruit in the ethos of the CSI.

Basel Evangelical Mission Society [BEM] or German Mission.

The Basel Mission arrived in Malabar in 1836, combining evangelism with economic and social reform. Understanding the hardships of local communities, they established industries such as tile factories, weaving centers, and printing presses, which provided employment and dignity to the marginalized. Their model of integrating faith with socio-economic upliftment became a pioneering approach to mission.

One of their most enduring contributions was through Rev. Hermann Gundert, a scholar and missionary. He gave Malayalam its first structured grammar book, Malayalabhaasha Vyakaranam, and compiled the first Malayalam-English dictionary (1872). He also developed school curricula that shaped Kerala's educational system. BEM established a printing press in 1941 at Mangalore and in 1945 at Nettur, Thalassery. This press was well known for publishing Christian literature, school textbooks, and translations in Malayalam, Tulu, and Kannada.

Through these initiatives, the Basel Mission not only proclaimed Christ but also reshaped the cultural and economic fabric of Kerala.

The Living Legacy of CSI

The formation of the Church of South India in 1947 was the fruit of the long and sacrificial labors of CMS, LMS, and Basel Mission pioneers. They brought together gospel proclamation, education, social reform, and cultural transformation, leaving behind a church that is rooted in Christ and committed to justice, equality, and service.

This year, as CSI completes 78 years of unity in witness and service, we are called to carry forward this mission. The legacy of these missionary movements reminds us that our faith must go hand in hand with action-preaching the gospel, serving the poor, fighting injustice, and nurturing education.

May this anniversary be not just a remembrance of the past but a recommitment to the future. As we look ahead, let us thank God for the rich heritage we have inherited and pledge ourselves anew to the vision of CSI: "That they all may be one" (John 17:21).





78th Anniversary of the Church of South India (CSI) September 27, 2025

The Church of South India (CSI) is a United and Uniting Protestant Missionary Christian denomination that was formed in 1947 through the union of several churches in South India, including the Anglican, Methodist, Presbyterian, Congregational, and Reformed traditions. It is a member of the global Anglican Communion, though it also embraces a broader ecumenical heritage. The CSI emphasizes unity, social justice, and mission work, and has a strong presence in southern India. Its structure is episcopal, with bishops overseeing dioceses, and its liturgy combines elements from different Christian traditions. The church is known for its commitment to both spiritual and social development.

The formation of the Church of South India in 1947 is often described as a *second Pentecost* experience, echoing the first century AD.

Context and Formation of CSI

The Reformation of the 16th century Church in Europe led to many denominations, but they did not engage in mission immediately. German Pietism was an instrument in the Evangelical Revival of the 18th century in England and the USA. It led to the formation of missionary societies by different denominations. Initially, the missionary societies were not for transplanting their denominations in the mission fields. But later, many mission societies came to India for evangelization, and they planted churches in the title of their church.

The following missionary societies ultimately facilitated the formation of the Church of South India: the Church Missionary Society [CMS], the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel [SPG], the London Missionary Society [LMS], the Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Society [WMMS], the Church of Scotland Mission [CSM], the Free Church of Scotland Mission, the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Mission [ABCFM], the American Madurai Mission, the American Ceylon Mission, the Dutch Reformed Church in America, the American Arcot Mission, and the Australian Presbyterian Mission.



From 1875 AD, missionaries as individuals met together for fellowship, prayers, and sharing of joys and sorrows in their mission fields, as well as to discuss methods and areas of cooperation and joint efforts. Later this fellowship grew to a regional level and formed the National Missionary Council of India in 1914. Later it changed its name to the National Council of Churches in India [NCCI].

The Presbyterians and Congregationalists began negotiations to form one church. As a result, in 1908 the South India United Church (SIUC) came into being. The American Ceylon (Jaffna Mission) joined it. The Malabar Area of the Basel Mission came under the care of the SIUC during the First World War. The SIUC, from its inception, took steps to achieve wider union with other churches in South India.

The first effort with the Wesleyan Methodists was not fruitful. Its next effort with the Anglicans resulted in a meeting at Tranquebar in May 1919. It was attended by 33 persons—7 from the Anglican side and 26 from the SIUC. This meeting issued a statement which came to be known as the **Tranquebar Manifesto.** It declared that church unity is the will of God, that it is Biblical, that divisions in the church affected evangelism in India, and that church divisions were not the making of Indians and so they did not wish to perpetuate them.

The Wesleyan Methodists [the Methodist Church districts of Madras, Mysore, Trichinopoly, and Hyderabad] joined the church union negotiations in 1925 and gave their approval in 1943. The Anglican dioceses of the Church of India, Burma, and Ceylon-namely Madras, Travancore-Cochin, Tirunelveli, and Dornakal-gave their consent in 1945. SIUC councils gave their consent in 1946. These efforts culminated in the historic union on September 27, 1947, in St. George's Cathedral, Madras, making the CSI the first organic church union of its kind in the world.

The growing nationalism and nationalist spirit among Indian Christians were also a factor for church union. Prior to 1947, South India was home to a variety of Protestant mission churches. At the time of its formation, the Church of South India (CSI) had 14 dioceses and a membership of approximately 1.3 million.

CSI Today (2025)

Over time, the CSI expanded and reorganized, increasing the number of dioceses. Today, there are dioceses across Tamil Nadu, Kerala, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Sri Lanka, and even beyond.

As of 2025, being the largest Protestant church in India, the **Church of South India** (**CSI**) has:

- 26 dioceses
- Nearly 4.5 million believers
- Around 15,000 congregations
- Over 3,300 ordained ministers
- 104 hospitals
- 130 colleges
- 2,000 schools
- Numerous mission fields, orphanages, CDC centers, women's empowerment schemes, vocational training centers, and hostels for underprivileged children.

The Church of South India (CSI) logo is a powerful representation of the church's faith, mission, and unity. It brings together Christian and cultural symbols to express the identity of the church as a united body of believers, rooted in Christ and called to serve the world.

- **The Burning Cross:** The cross with flames symbolizes the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. The flames remind us of Pentecost (Acts 2:3), equipping the church for mission, purifying, strengthening, and renewing the faithful.
- **The Lotus Flower:** A symbol of purity and resilience in Indian culture. The cross inside the lotus signifies the rooting of Christian faith in Indian soil. Just as the lotus rises above muddy waters, Christians are called to live holy lives amidst worldly challenges.

Together, these symbols proclaim the CSI's commitment to being a witnessing, serving, and spiritually renewed church, shining the light of Christ in the world.

God's Gift of Music

Music is a gift from God that can lift our spirits, comfort us, join us in a common mission, serve as a place of refuge during difficult times, encourage us, express what's in our hearts, and touch us deeply, sometimes more than words can say.

Actual unity is better than feelings of unity.

It's a powerful experience to sing at the top of your lungs in the midst of a crowd. Everyone knows the lyrics, no one is distracted, and the feeling of oneness is overwhelming. But unlike music, Jesus actually makes us one. And our singing expresses that unity Jesus decisively made possible through the cross (Ephesians 2:14–15).

Singing together with other believers is massively different from singing at a rock concert, sporting event, or karaoke party. And if we don't know the difference, we're probably valuing music over Jesus.
